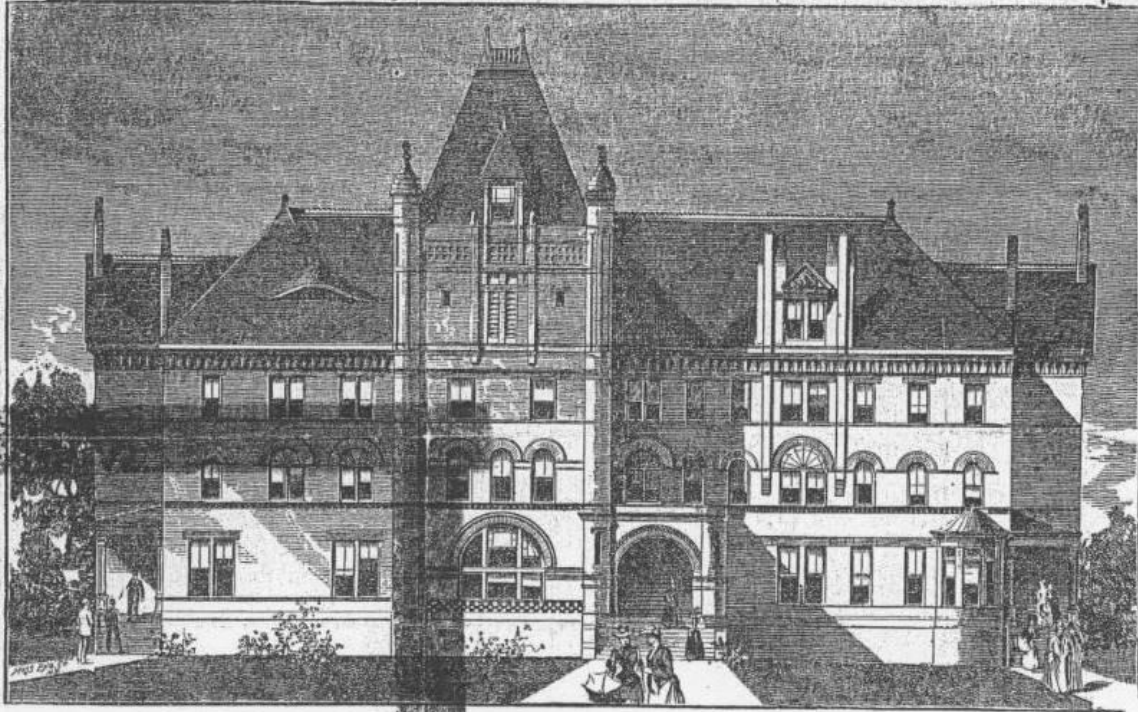

DESPITE the stringency of the times, the institution has just closed a very successful term, having had an average attendance in excess of any previous year. The friends of the College everywhere are enthusiastic, and its triumphant success is assured.

The magnificent three-story building, over 150 feet, with slated roof and trimmed in Bedford stone, is in every way adapted to college purposes, and can accommodate five hundred students.

The College is located on the main line of the East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia Railway, twenty-nine miles east of Knoxville, in the town of Mossy Creek.

There are three courses of study—the Classical, Latin-Scientific and the English. Instruction will be given in Penmanship, Book-keeping and Normal Methods without any additional charge.

Miss MATTIE E JACKSON, of Oxford, Mississippi, our newly-elected Principal of Music, has enjoyed the finest opportunities for musical training this country affords, and has taught with marked success.

Physical drill is required one-half hour each day. The Bible is studied systematically by the entire school. Ministerial students will have a special course in Bible study, lectures being given from time to time by distinguished preachers.

Social culture is made a special feature. The "Young Ladies' Home," under the supervision of Mrs. H. S. BURNETT, affords first-class boarding accommodations. The cost of board and lodging is from \$8.00 to \$10.00 per month. Students can rent rooms and board at a much lower rate. Tuition is from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per month. Library fee is 20c. per month and contingent fee 30c. per month.

Children of ministers, actively engaged as pastors or evangelists, or of deceased ministers, are charged only half rates on tuition.

Tuition and contingent fee are free to worthy ministerial students. They pay the library fee. Indigent ministers are assisted on their board and books.

The College is noted for its moral and religious influence on the students. There is no saloon in the town. For further information, address
